CPR and AED Training April 18, 1 pm



The <u>Salem Fire Foundation</u> will be training us in the use of our new AED unit. The Rotary Club donated the AED to the Center.

These electrical devices are crucial in improving the chance of survival of a person suffering from sudden cardiac arrest. "When you have a cardiac arrest, you have a number of minutes before you start going down the survivability scale."

It might take the fire department four minutes to get to a person experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. The chance of survival drops by 10 percent every minute. At six minutes, a person starts to experience brain death.

In 2015 the Salem Fire Department recorded an 80 percent save rate during sudden cardiac arrests through the use of AED's.

Our thanks to the Rotary Club for this life-saving donation! Please join us an up-to-the minute lesson on use of CPR and the new AED unit.

First of all, a great big Thank You to neighbors of our members, who take some of our leftovers and ends of rolls and create beautiful afghans/lap quilts, hats, scarves, and mittens. We appreciate your contributions and so do the recipients of those items. We distribute these items to Operation School Bell, Helping Hands, Serenity Hospice, and Warming Centers.

Recently Serenity Hospice requested Fidget quilts for Alzheimer & Dementia patients. They brought us examples which are smaller than lap quilts and have movable items so the patient can "fidget" with them.

One of our quilting members brought a small quilt with a toy teddy bear attached to a shoe string, tucked into a pocket. She attached a fuzzy pompom made of yarn with a button that could be moved along a cord. Stitched on were two squares 18" made of fuzzy yarn and various items. The 'fidgets' are attached with a zigzag stitch or hand sewn. Check your stash for fidget items!

Is your Go-Bag ready in case of an Emergency?

Roger Corrado volunteers in the computer room and between his duties at the Center he also is involved with Emergency Preparedness Training.

In case of an emergency, Roger recommends preparing a Go-Bag you can grab at a moment's notice.

To assemble your kit, store items in airtight plastic bags and put your entire disaster supplies kit in one or two easy-to-carry containers such as plastic bins, a duffel bag or backpack. A basic emergency supply kit could include the following recommended Water - one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation Food - at least a three-day supply of nonperishable food Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert Flashlight & extra batteries First aid kit & medication supplies Whistle to signal for help



Dust mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to **shelter-in-place** Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation Wrench or pliers to **turn off utilities** Manual can opener for food Local maps

Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery.

Call the State of Oregon Emergency Preparedness division to order a Go-Passport. Fill it out with your personal information, family member contact info, medication lists, etc. Want a more complete list of how to prepare? Download the <u>Recommended Supplies List</u>
