Entering Lorene Patrick's home is like stepping into a wonderland full of fantastic creatures. Everywhere you look are hideaways, cottages, circuses, workshops & houses made of shoes where tiny lives are lived. All of these intricate dioramas have one thing in common, their creator **Lorene Patrick**.

In the 1960s Lorene purchased her first carving tools and began creating. She was inspired by the tiny dolls and miniature toys she treasured as a child. And now, 89 1/2 years old, she shows no sign of slowing down. In fact, her creativity and passion is truly inspiring and her tiny creations are a wonder to behold.

Delighted by the work of hobby miniaturists, she joined a miniature group in the Portland area. Eventually she was consumed by her hobby & found herself a member of six miniaturist groups. Her hobby allowed her to travel to England and other faraway places to see the work being done by other craftsmen.

Slowly she left the miniature groups and set out on her own. Her imagination lead her to create unique dioramas on her own. At a craft show one artist displayed tiny dolls made from chickpeas. There, her creative mind took off as she assembled miniature scenes and tiny habitats.

Lorene carves each diorama by hand, assembling scenes that are the work of a master

puppeteer. Tiny clothes, shoes with buckles, fireplaces. Each exquisite detail is handcrafted.

Look, here. In one corner you'll see the interior of Geppetto's workshop, with several Pinocchios and minute wood shavings on the floor. Tiny brushes and paint pots sit



readied on a miniature workbench at the puppeteers elbow.

Turn your head again and you'll see a scene from Wind in the Willows where Toad sits in his easy chair by the fire underneath a pastoral image hung over the hearth.

Lorene has lovingly created each and every one of these scenes from wood, beans, bits and pieces of gathered fabric, leather, remnants of seed heads turned upside down to be a woodstove for a tiny mouse, and tidy garden rows fashioned from spices turn into cabbage heads and such.

Lions, giraffes, clowns, acrobats, trapeze artists, miniature bands, popcorn munching chickpea headed audiences are transfixed by the magic that is happening under the Big Top. Each and every one of these scenes are created from a single idea. Lorene starts with no plan and no pattern, simply a germ of imagination.

Take a few minutes to visit with Lorene while she is volunteering at Nifty Thrifty and strike up a conversation with her about her carving hobby. Watch as her eyes sparkle. Be regaled about her latest creation. We promise! you WILL be transported to a fantastic world filled with curiosity and a generous dose of magic during your visit with Lorene.

Along with all of the items created by our own group, we had items donated from others. Joyce Wall brought hats for newborn babies and left them at the SSS desk. One of our own members, Charlyne DeMonnin, has a neighbor, Margaret Brown, who knits myriads of items for children. Charlyne delivers them to us. This month there were many baby items: hats, sweaters, and booties, along with many sweaters for pre-school children with unique buttons, as well as mittens, and hats of various styles.

Even with the warm weather and summer coming, we still continue to knit, crochet, and create. We had several inquiries about Fidget Quilts: what they are, how to make, what size, etc. Originally, the bases were made using small quilts. A good size is about 30 inches square. However, we have several ladies who don't quilt, but are very creative. They knit or crochet squares of about 30 inches and attach items to them, such as strings of large buttons, zippers, little pockets with things that fit into them, circles of lace, a piece of fluffy fabric. In other words, things that can be fidgeted with.

One lady used large knitting needles and a very fluffy yarn to make a square before attaching items. The yarn itself was fidget-able! We meet every Monday from 1:00 to 3:00.

We are seeking 4-5 drivers per month, so please volunteer your time and car to join in the fun. We are looking for volunteers ASAP, so don't wait!



**Francis Fredrickson** has been a familiar face at the South Salem Senior Center for more than 20 years.

Francis was born on the Sterling Cattle Ranch where she was raised with her brother and sister. Her father, though crippled worked to acquire their ranch property as is the land came available. His goal of building the ranch is an enduring legacy since Sterling Cattle Ranch is 99 years old, continuing to operate successfully to this day

Francis went to boarding school in Thompson Falls until the second World War. At that point, all travel was stopped except for military travel. This meant change: she and her sister began attending boarding school in Great Falls returning to the ranch on weekends to help with work.

The sisters mainly focused on farming the 1/4 acre vegetable garden where any of the townspeople from the

small town of Craig could come to get fresh food.

After graduating from Great Falls High School, Francis

attended the University of Arizona in Tucson. While there, she met her future husband Chuck Fredrickson on a blind date. They were introduced to by a friend. And it was the ONLY blind date Francis ever went on!


Once Chuck's military stint ended, Francis and her husband moved to Helena, then to Salem. Chuck worked for the highway department where work promotions meant the family had to move often. They lived in several different parts of the state.



Francis played the clarinet

Because of the frequent moves, the family learned

school's curriculum varied from district to district. That meant the Fredrickson children were schooled at home in several subjects Despite so many relocations, the family was very active in scouting, sports and music.






