a gentle demeanor. But yet, she has been a shrewd and strong career woman.

She hales from a farming community called Grandville, Iowa. Population 350. She was the 3rd daughter and had a younger brother. There were 11 months separating her from her older sister and younger brother. She loved dressing up in her mom's clothes and playing house. She did have a playhouse that she decorated and played make believe in. Yet she played cowboys and Indians with her brother, tearing around with wooden guns whooping and hollering. She helped with chores, where she collected eggs, cleaned house and worked in the garden. Paula began school at four and a half years old in a combination kindergarten first grade school. Half kindergarten, half first grade. She stayed in this school until grade 3. She then attended Catholic School that was the predominant school of the community. Paula was a cheerleader in high school. She also participated in plays. She once played "Cinderella ". Her ball gown was her older sister's wedding dress. I can picture Paula spinning around on a dance floor with her elegant slippers.

Before graduating from high school Paula wanted to be a nurse but soon changed her mind. She attended a woman's Catholic college where she took teaching courses for 2 years. Her second year was a defining and painful time in her life. Her younger brother was involved in an auto accident. He was alone and never regained consciousness. He died at 2:00 a.m. surrounded by family. She had to return to college to do her practice teaching. She was given much support and love by her friends and teachers. Her

catholic upbringing carried her through and continues to do so. It is safe to say Catholicism has been the strength in her life. She is a member of Queen of Peace Church and a Eucharistic Minister.

During the Spring unbeknownst to her she met her future husband, , Bill Hindman, while she was on a blind date. She knew he was Mr. Right from the getgo. They had a long-distance romance while she finished her education and he pursued his career with IBM.

They married and had a daughter a year later. Over the next few years they adopted two sons. Their family was now complete. These children brought her 9 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren. They were a normal family, they built homes, raised children and moved a bit with Bill's successful career. Paula was a homemaker, mother and eventually a college student again. She went on to obtain a teacher's certificate and taught elementary school. As fate would have it, she took a different path and went on to business school and became a secretary. She worked for a small architectural firm for 3 years and later was the General Manager at a Hilton hotel for 9 years. At the age of 65 Paula joined an Art and History Museum and became a docent. After training, she gave tours and presentations. But amazingly, Paula was not through. She went on to be a legal secretary for 4 more years where she and Bill had retired to in South Dakota. .

Paula lost her beloved Bill in 2010. They were

married 52 years. She has lived in Oregon with her family for 4 years. I know that I have left many details of this amazing woman out. As I said at the beginning I am working with too little space to tell you about her complex and interesting life.



The Brief History of Christmas in the United States

Christmas celebrations typical in Europe made their way into America in the southern colonies, where one could find feasting, gift-giving, hospitality, dancing and fireworks. The French in Louisiana, English in New York, and German in Pennsylvania also brought with them their Christmas traditions. "Most settlers and adventurers arriving in the New World welcomed Christmas as a day of respite from the routines of work and hardship." However, not everyone in the new American colonies shared a love for the day. The Puritans of the Massachusetts Bay Colony did not observe Christmas, with Governor John Winthrop even attempting to suppress it. One author writes. "The Puritans showed their disdain for this pagan festival by planning hard work for the day and passing a law forbidding the

celebration of Christmas."

By the late 19th and early 20th centuries, however, Christmas celebrations had become very popular and reflected the expanding commerce that America became known for following the Industrial Revolution. While it would be too negative to attribute the rise of Christmas in America solely to "capitalist greed," it "has always been more secular than sacred," and the business aspect has played a significant role in its popularity. But while the marketplace has had its influence, other factors have contributed, too, such as a longing for connection to the past and genuine desire to connect with others, such as in the giving of gifts.


