South Salem Seniors Center Newsletter



Crafters News !




Thanksgiving Day

Contrary to legend, the pilgrims weren't the first colonists to share a meal of thanks with Native Americans. That honor belongs to the settlers of St. Augustine, Florida, who ate hardback and beans in September 1565. The celebration at Plymouth in the fall 0f 1621 was a three-day event to give thanks for a bountiful harvest. It included "as much fowl as [ordinarily]...served the company almost a week."

George Washington proclaimed the first two national days of Thanksgiving, but these were onetime affairs. Our nationwide celebration owes its existence to one woman's 40-tear campaign; in 1863 Sarah Josepha Hale finally persuaded President Lincoln to set aside the fourth Thursday in November as a national day of thanks. Only once has the tradition been tampered with: in 1939 President Franklin D. Roosevelt moved Thanksgiving to the third Thursday in November. Why? To accommodate merchants who wanted to increase the number of shopping days between Thanksgiving and Christmas. This decision was so unpopular that in 1941 Roosevelt moved the Holiday back to where it originally was.

Easiest-Ever Pumpkin Pie

Ingredients:

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- can (15 oz) pumpkin (not pumpkin pie mix) 1
- 1 1/4 cups evaporated milk or half and half
- 2 eggs, beaten

Pillsbury™ Pet-Ritz® frozen deep-dish pie 1 crust

Steps:

1 Heat oven to 425°F. In large bowl, mix filling ingredients. Pour into pie crust.

2 Bake 15 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 350°F; bake 40 to 50 minutes longer or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Cool 2 hours. Serve or refrigerate until serving time. Store in refrigerator.

Note:

Unlike other pies, a pumpkin pie can be made entirely from pantry items. Stock up on pure canned pumpkin and evaporated milk when they're on sale so you can make a pumpkin pie without having to make a trip to the store.


