Word games such as Boggle, Hangman and crosswords as well as card games, number games, memory games, puzzles and trivia

Travelogues, virtual museum tours, TED Talks and other educational content Spirituality resources for the major world religions

Both the tablet and web version are designed for those with limited technology experience and/or physical or cognitive limitations, including large picture-based icons and large font sizes.

PUMPKIN MUFFINS TWO INGREDIENTS!

INGREDIENTS

1 box spice cake mix

1 15 oz can pumpkin puree (not pie filling)

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat to 325 degrees.

Mix spice cake mix together with pumpkin. Scoop into lined or well sprayed muffin wells.

OPTIONAL - add chocolate chips

Bake 18-20 minutes (until toothpick comes out clean).

Stir together cake mix and a can of pumpkin. Make sure you use the smaller can (15 or 16 oz). This makes 12 muffins which take about 18 minutes to bake. DONE!

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
