Our financial situation is still holding strong. But we are like people who hang on to money, but no children to pass it on to. Consider yourselves our brothers, sisters, and children. We are in a serious state of attrition. This Center is capable of so many wonderful possibilities. But none of them are possible without growth. We want the Center to be appealing to the next generations. We were fortunate to open our doors up dren. Personally, I prefer April Fools. It is interest- after this horrific pandemic, many others were not able to. I feel I have said enough at this time. Please consider what I have said. Blessings to you and your loved ones.

As of this writing, a master gardener speaker for March has NOT yet come through; but I'm still calling, trying all my resources....so who knows...????


It seems we had a FAUX Spring in February, now Winter is still hanging around. BUT, there are signs of SPRING Everywhere. The weather just doesn't feel like it.


What a bargain!

Is Your Membership Current?


