Popular Seminar on Health and Aging Returns

This important free seminar in the form of roundtable discussion returns to the Center for a second six weeks beginning Thursday, April 13th from 10 am to 11:30 am and will continue through the five following Thursdays: April 20th, 27th and May 4th, 11th and 18th. Members participating in the first series gave it high marks for being informative and encouraging lively interaction among the attendees. The forum is provided by a coalition of Center 50+, Marion County Older Adult Behavioral Health Initiative, Western Oregon University's Gerontology Department and Salem Health's Community Health and Education Center (CHEC). These sessions are relaxed and discussion-oriented. Upon registration, each participant will receive a free 95-page booklet titled <u>Promoting Healthy</u> <u>Aging</u>. Topics include illness prevention strategies, medical screenings, exercise, sleep, nutrition, mental health, mindbody work, supplements, loneliness and methods to change health behaviors. From last month's newsletter you all know that a valuable member of our team has retired.




